Meet Two of Our Friendly Customer Service Reps

lan Moore

"I just wanted to recognize Ian for his great customer service in helping me to find the pickup location in Detroit! He was very helpful." So wrote one of our passengers last month on Michigan Flyer's Facebook page. That's not unusual praise by any means.



lan Moore was hardly a newbie when he officially joined our team as a customer representative last year. In fact, he'd been hearing about Michigan Flyer since he was child.

That's because his mother, Diane Moore, has been the Flyer's sales manager since our airport shuttle was first launched in 2006. And, ever since he was a teen, she has recruited him to help load and unload luggage in East Lansing, and at Detroit Metro Airport (DTW), during peak travel periods.

Working with Flyer customers has proven to be a valuable learning experience for lan, a junior at Michigan State University who's studying Human Resources. "I'm a people person and outgoing so it's a

lot of fun to come in and help our customers," he says, adding that once he became a customer rep, he was surprised by how many folks count on the Flyer's services.

While on his shift at the Flyer, Ian fields calls from customers, sells tickets, helps passengers find the best times to depart for our scheduled stops in East Lansing, Brighton, Ann Arbor, and at DTW, and then catch the bus back home again. And he still helps out during our busiest times, particularly when hordes of MSU and U-M students are coming or going at the beginning or end of a semester.

On top of a full schedule of classes and his Michigan Flyer job, Ian also has another part-time position. This summer, he'll be fulfilling an internship in Human Resources at the Grand Traverse Resort in Traverse City, Mich.

Service with a Smile

One of the things that's important to Ian is trying to always answer calls with a smile and positive attitude. "Most folks I talk with are very good people, but there are always a few who want to vent. You try not to take it personally."

And because Michigan Flyer is also an inexpensive and valuable service for international travelers who are coming to Michigan, language barriers can be a challenge. "When English is not a first language for our customers, I do my best to listen, repeat and apologize if I'm not understanding them completely. My top goal is to get them to where they want to go as smoothly as possible."

lan credits his parents for his strong work ethic and says he's also certain that, among his siblings, he's the favorite. As the youngest, before he came to work here, lan was accustomed to hearing how much his mom missed him. Working together has solved some of that. "We're having lots of fun. We are definitely two peas in a pod. We're spending more time together, so she's happy."

Luke Montgomery

A native of Troy, Mich., who grew up in nearby Sterling Heights, Luke Montgomery was recruited by his roommate and friend, Ian Moore, to become a customer representative for Michigan Flyer.

"lan was trying to reduce his hours here and thought it would be good if I could take some of those over," says Luke, also a junior at MSU. He's studying both Computer Science and Engineering.

The two were paired their freshman year at MSU and have been roommates since. He heard about the Flyer from Ian. "I knew what it was and what he did, but until I started working here I had no idea how big it was and how many students at both MSU and the University of Michigan rely on this service."



Luke also had never traveled on a luxury 56-passenger motorcoach before he began working at our East Lansing office. "The first time I was on one, I was surprised to see how many people use our service every day," he says, adding: "The amenities on the buses are so great, like quality passenger seats and Wi-Fi so people can use their phones and laptops while traveling."

Like Ian, Luke also answers calls from customers, sells tickets, helps folks with their travel plans when they're trying to find the best times to catch the Flyer, assists with loading and unloading luggage, and helps redirect our drivers if there's an accident or other impediment

on their regular route to and from East Lansing, Brighton, Ann Arbor and DTW.

Heightened Appreciation

Since he's been working for us for nearly a year, Luke has noticed that his communication skills have improved. "Every day you're talking with lots of different types of people to help them as best you can," he says. "I've learned to respond more quickly on my feet. And while I've always tried to be patient when I was the recipient, I feel like I'm even more appreciative of good customer service."

When he's not busy with work and classes, Luke enjoys getting together with like-minded MSU students for "Spartan Hack-a-Thons." As he explains it, "We're a group of coders who work on different computer programming challenges a few times a semester."



Travel Alerts

Book Early: Student Exodus Ahead

If you're planning to ride with Michigan Flyer-AirRide in early May, it's best to buy your tickets without delay. The end of term at the University of Michigan and Michigan State University means full motorcoaches for us as students depart their campuses. Commencement activities for U-M students will be held April 29-May 1; for MSU students, commencements are May 6-8.

The former North Terminal at DTW is now the Evans Terminal

On April 4, 2022, DTW changed the name of its North Terminal to the "Warren Cleage Evans Terminal"—(or Evans Terminal, for short)—in honor of his more than 52 years of public service to the people of Wayne County, Mich. PLEASE NOTE: As the airport updates its signage during the next few weeks, be aware that some signs will reflect the new name, while others won't.

Travel Mask Mandate Suspended

Based on CDC recommendations, and due to the growing presence of a COVID Omicron subvariant, the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) had extended its directive that travelers must wear face masks on public transportation and in transportation hubs until May 3. But then on April 18, a U.S District Judge in Florida, Kathryn Kimball Mizelle, declared the mandate was unlawful nationwide. So, pending a possible appeal, masks are NOT required for people traveling on public transportation.



Sample Airfares for Summer

Yes, airfares have been rising over the past few months. But not all of them are high, especially if you stick with domestic destinations and buy tickets early. Also, you may want to consider getting away to someplace steeped in history, and celebrate America's 247th birthday there. Possibilities abound in the list below.

Using <u>Expedia.com</u> and <u>Skyscanner.com</u>, we spotchecked prices for the cheapest roundtrips originating at DTW on Saturday, June 25, and returning on

Tuesday, July 5. Among the search criteria we used: Roundtrips had to be non-stop in both directions, and the return flight had to arrive at DTW in time for you to catch our last run at 8:15/8:30 p.m. to Ann Arbor, Brighton and East Lansing.

Note that some of the prices below are so-called "hacker fares," meaning the departing flight is on a different airline than the return flight (e.g., "United + Delta").

You may well be able to find lower prices than shown here if you're flexible about travel dates and/or willing to change planes on the way to your destination. These **roundtrip** economy fares include taxes but not necessarily baggage or other "extras":





Want More Daily Roundtrips? Help Us Find More Drivers
