The Regional Transit Authority of Southeast Michigan (RTA) in partnership with the Ann Arbor Area Transportation Authority is working to implement a new commuter bus service between Detroit and Ann Arbor, thanks to funding received from State grants. The service—to be operated by Michigan Flyer and Indian Trails—will provide non-stop trips between Detroit and Ann Arbor and is open to anyone to use. Service is expected to begin later this winter. Final Notice: Michigan Flyer-AirRide seats will likely sell out during the Feb. 28-March 10 spring break period for students at Michigan State University and the University of Michigan. Again this year, spring break at both universities is set for the first week in March, which means it will be difficult for us to accommodate everyone who'd like to ride with us then. That's because roughly 96,000 students from the East Lansing and Ann Arbor campuses combined will be traveling, along with many of their 42,000 faculty and staff members. So, reserve your seats early if you're planning for us to take you to DTW and back.



Travel Bargains

New Flights from DTW to Munich Coming in May
This bears repeating from our report in August.
Beginning on May 4, 2020, Lufthansa will fly nonstop
from Munich (MUC) to Detroit Metro Airport five times a
week—on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays
and Saturdays. The flights will depart at 12:40 p.m. and
land at DTW at 3:45 p.m. Munich time. The return
flights to Germany will take off at 5:35 p.m. Detroit time,
arriving in Munich at 7:45 a.m. the next morning. The

new flights are part of Lufthansa's summer flight schedule, which expands its long-haul program for international leisure travelers to U.S. destinations. However, access to the MUC hub also opens up more choices for U.S. travelers to Europe, Africa, and the Middle East in lower-tier fares.

Farewell to Two-Million-Mile Safe Driver Ernie Nieman

Coffeehouse and Theater, 306 W. Main St., Brighton. Tickets \$29.

The average American driver travels about 14,000 miles a year—or about 980,000 miles in a lifetime—and has three or four accidents, <u>according to industry experts</u>.

In contrast, last June, Ernie Nieman accomplished what only three other bus drivers in the 110-year history of our parent company, Indian Trails, have done so far: He reached two million miles of driving a motorcoach without a preventable accident.

That equates to 80 trips around the Earth or four trips to the Moon and back. Just to reach one million miles a driver must average 50,000 miles annually for 20 years.



Ernie, who recently retired from Indian Trails, earned his first million-mile safe driving award back in 2005. Last December, he and other staff members were honored at our annual Service Awards Dinner for their years of service.

Ernie started driving part-time for another bus company while running a barber shop he had owned for more than a decade. He liked driving much better than cutting hair.

He joined us in 1990 after meeting fellow driver Carl Briggs at a ball game, and found himself intrigued by

what Carl had to say about Indian Trails.

Some Places He's Gone

In his 29 years with us, Ernie has substituted for Michigan Flyer drivers who were sick or on vacation, and taken group charter buses to every state in the continental U.S. except California, Oregon and Washington, as well as through much of Canada. He's also piloted daily scheduled runs from cities in Michigan to Chicago and back, and then north to St. Ignace.

Among his favorite charter trips were those offered as part of the "Michigan Lakes & Mackinac Island" summer package by Tauck Tours. These eight-day excursions give folks from all over an opportunity to explore the wonders of northern Michigan.

Also memorable was a trip to New Orleans a few months after Hurricane Katrina. "I took a group of volunteers there who'd signed up to help with the ongoing clean-up efforts," he recalls. "Even though there was rebuilding going on, you could see that the devastation had been terrible. There was still much to be done."

Why We Were His Perfect Fit

Though Ernie came to us as an experienced bus driver, he still had to go through the same four-week intensive training as all new Indian Trails drivers.

"In my previous job, they put me behind the wheel and had me drive from Alma to Mt. Pleasant, Mich., and back, and then to Midland with one of the owners," he recalls. "The next day, I was on my own. At Indian Trails, there's a lot that's covered before you ever get into the driver's seat. Passenger safety is always number one."

As he adjusts to retirement, Ernie values the years he had with us and the friendships he forged with fellow employees. "I really didn't know too much about Indian Trails and how long it's been around when I first started. But early on, I remember seeing all these pictures that date back decades and decades. They treat their employees very well and are so considerate. I've really enjoyed it all."
