Meet Your Driver: George Lostracco

When he was a toddler in the 1980s, a family friend arranged for George Lostracco to see an Indian Trails motorcoach up close, and his parents snapped a picture of their little boy in the driver's seat.

It took some time for George to get back behind the wheel, but when he did in 2014, he knew he'd found the right spot. For the past year, he's been piloting a Michigan Flyer motorcoach.

A native of Owosso—the home of Indian Trails— George's career had included working in both a bank and insurance company, processing retirement

accounts and taking phone calls. Then he felt the itch to get out of his cubicle.

"I had a bachelor's degree in business from Central Michigan University and had worked as a cook in college dorms and in construction," he says. "But after a few years of office life, it felt constrictive and I wasn't enjoying it."

George thought about getting back into construction when a friend mentioned he was going to apply for a driver position at Indian Trails. "My friend wound up not applying," he recalls. "But I did. I was going in blind in hopes of doing something different."

Benefits of Training

Like many new recruits, George had no experience driving anything larger than a car or small truck. He remembers being impressed with the company's thorough, six-week training program. "It was laid out so well and we were reassured that we could take the time we needed to feel comfortable."

Even with the training, George clearly remembers the first time he went out on the highway with other new drivers to take turns behind the wheel. "We pulled into a parking lot and Jeff Hutchinson, the VP of Operations, told me it was my turn. He assured me I could do it. I white-knuckled it for about 10 miles and then settled down. It was a real confidence booster."

The Spice of Variety

In his eight-year career with Indian Trails, George has served as a driver on daily scheduled routes, and taken charter groups on bus trips to specific destinations. Now he's driving for Michigan Flyer, which shuttles between East Lansing, Brighton, Ann Arbor and Detroit Metro Airport nine times a day.

"I love it all," he says. "The variety is great. It can make for an exciting day. Our charter trips have taken me places I never expected to go. I enjoy switching it up, though that may not appeal to everyone. The good news is that, after six months to a year here, you can pretty much choose what suits you best—a regular route or the variety of charter trips."

One of George's favorite charter trips is to the Cedar Point amusement park in Sandusky, Ohio. That's because it always involves transporting a group of happy travelers. Plus, it's usually fun for him, too. "It's a laid-back kind of trip. You arrive. You're going to be there for a while. You get to talk with other drivers, and you can even have some fun on the rides while waiting for your passengers to complete their day. You get to appreciate the experience."

Enjoying the Ride

For all his initial nerves, George recalls when he realized that his passengers, once on board, weren't really paying attention to him. "I thought it would be a lot of pressure, but they're just sitting back and enjoying the ride, reading a book, working on their laptops or whatever. They're happy to be going somewhere or heading home."

After almost a year with Michigan Flyer, George says he never gets tired of hearing new passengers praise the shuttle service. "They tell me how happy they are that the service exists, that it's affordable, convenient, and alleviates so many headaches in terms of connecting with Detroit Metro Airport."

In his downtime, George likes to tend to his lawn and garden, and listen to podcasts on such diverse subjects as history, geography, and economics.

And he's grateful that he listened to the friend who suggested he apply at Indian Trails: "I felt it from the first day. The buses are terrific. The mechanics keep them in great shape, as do the bus washers. It's like a family here, from those in the office right on down. Everyone's so friendly and relaxed. I'm glad I'm here."

Big crowds in downtown Ann Arbor for the Art Fair.


The ongoing fair, now in its 62nd year, draws nearly half a million attendees annually. People come to see—and purchase—works created by nearly 1,000 artists in virtually every medium that are displayed over 30 city blocks downtown. The fair also features live music and art activities, dining and sidewalk sales. It continues on Friday, July 22, 10 a.m.—9 p.m., and Saturday, July 23, 10 a.m.—8 p.m.

Reserve Seats Early—Here Come the College Students!

If you're planning to ride with us between mid-August and Labor Day, it would be wise to reserve your seats soon. That's because students and faculty will soon be flooding into East Lansing and Ann Arbor—and many will be traveling on Michigan Flyer-AirRide.

More than 50,000 students and faculty members will be arriving at the University of Michigan, whose classes begin on Aug. 29. Roughly the same number are destined for Michigan State University, where classes begin on Aug. 31. While some local residents may miss the quiet of summer, the throngs of college students bring

many positives—including a vibrant atmosphere, and an estimated \$2 billion boost for the mid-Michigan economy.



Airfares for Late Summer Getaways

While airfares have been rising lately, by using Skyscanner.com we were still able to find reasonable prices for domestic roundtrips originating at Detroit Metro Airport (DTW) on Friday, Sept. 9, and returning on Sunday, Sept. 18. Among the criteria used for our spot check: Flights had to be non-stop in both directions, and the return had to arrive at DTW in time for you to catch our last run at 8:15 p.m./8:30 p.m. to Ann Arbor, Brighton, and East Lansing. You can surely find even lower prices if you're flexible about the dates of travel and/or willing to change planes on the way to your destination. 

The event promises "everything bacon," including bacon donuts, bacon mac & cheese, bacon beer and more, plus food trucks, games, and live music.

Fun for all ages, it runs from 3 p.m. (VIPs) or 4 p.m. (general admission) to 8 p.m. on Saturday, July 30. <u>Tickets</u> \$35-\$55 include festival entry, tokens for drinks and food samples, a souvenir cup and lanyard.




Detroit

Ribs and R&B Music Festival. Revelers at this annual event are treated to a summertime celebration of barbecue and great music. It features an outstanding lineup of 20+ food vendors serving up tasty ribs, brisket and chicken, eight full-service bars, as well as a variety of talented R&B and soul singers. Staged at Hart Plaza, it runs daily from 11:30 a.m. to midnight on Friday, Aug. 12, and through Sunday, Aug. 14. Admission is free until 5 p.m. on Friday, or until 2 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, and \$10 after that.

PLEASE NOTE: The D2A2 Express Bus from Ann Arbor's Blake Transit Center (BTC) to Detroit's Grand Circus Park can get Ann Arbor-area residents to and from the event listed above. It's within easy walking distance of D2A2's stop at Grand Circus Park in Detroit. When the D2A2 schedule coincides with Michigan Flyer's schedule at the BTC, it's also possible for East Lansing and Brighton residents to travel by motorcoach for some of these performances, too.
