### **Meet New Driver Heather Wyatt**

When Heather Wyatt first signed up to drive for Indian Trails, she thought she was just helping a friend. But instead, she found a new career and reinvigorated her life.

"A friend of mind worked at Indian Trails," Heather recalls, "and if she referred someone as a potential new driver, she would get a \$2,000 bonus—and I could get \$3,000 just for signing up." (The bonuses apply if the new driver works full time and stays on the job for at least nine months.)

A native of Flint, Heather moved to Owosso 10 years ago, and was working at local a Shell gas station

before applying at Indian Trails. She had no previous experience driving anything except a regular car and pickup truck.

"I was super nervous on the first day of driver training at Indian Trails," she says. "I was sitting in class with people who'd driven big trucks, school buses, and recreational vehicles. I was a blank slate."

She found her trainer, Safety Director Becky Smith, to be a godsend. "She was absolutely amazing. I just paid attention and took every bit of advice she had to give."

#### **Veteran Drivers Train New Hires**

Everyone who signs on as a potential driver for Indian Trails undergoes a free but intensive, six-week training program. In fact, they're paid while they learn the mechanics of a motorcoach, how to operate and maneuver a 56-passenger vehicle, safe driving techniques, customer service, and a lot more. They're taught by veteran drivers like Smith.

As one example, Heather says, "I was a little rough with braking early on. So it helped when Becky told me to think of braking as slowly squishing a marshmallow. After that, I took to it like a duck to water."

She appreciated, too, that when she was ready to go on the road the first few times, her trainer rode along to help guide her, if necessary. "When I finally got out on my own, I did get lost a couple of times, but I had the confidence instilled by my training to figure it out and get quickly back on track."

Driving a motorcoach does come with some challenges, especially in adverse weather conditions. "With Indian Trails and Michigan Flyer, the safety of our passengers is the number one priority," says Heather. "Our dispatch center is always there to help us if we need to seek an alternate route around a traffic jam, pull over for a while to wait out a severe storm, or to get off the road entirely."

#### A Whole New World

While Heather mostly drives regular daily routes and group charter trips for Indian Trails, she also serves as a substitute for Michigan Flyer drivers. That's what she's been doing since May, while a colleague is on leave.

As a "people person," Heather says her goal in life—and every time she's on duty—is to treat people the way she'd like to be treated.

"Delivering great customer service can be difficult nowadays," she says. "People are under stress in general and sometimes you get their wrath, but you can't take it personally. Most of the time, it has nothing to do with you. And it happens only rarely, anyway."

In fact, like other Michigan Flyer drivers, Heather is nearly always delighted by her passengers. Typically, they're either going to Detroit Metro Airport to travel somewhere exciting or to visit family and friends out of state, or they're happily heading back home.

"I'm likely better at driving a motorcoach than my own car. I'm even more attentive because I'm responsible for getting people safely to their destination, and I take that very seriously."

Heather also takes pride in the fact that the motorcoaches she drives are sleek, clean, and comfortable with special amenities that customers love like reclining seats, USB outlets, and Wi-Fi. And she appreciates the century-plus history of the family-owned company, which is run by descendants of the couple who first launched it. "That's amazing," she says.

She's particularly grateful that she listened to her friend and found a new career: "It turns out that I love driving—and I love the company. When I first stepped in the door, it felt so comfortable, like I became a member of the family."

Indian Trails (which staffs Michigan Flyer with professional drivers) is now accepting applications for full-time motorcoach drivers. These positions pay a starting hourly rate of \$20.40, plus a \$3,000 sign-on bonus, offer a great 4-6 week PAID training program, and operate Michigan's newest and largest fleet of motorcoaches. Full-time drivers also receive:

# Update on Our VP Ody Norkin's Mission to Ukraine

In our <u>May E-News</u>, we reported on the humanitarian missions of our vice president, Ody Norkin, to help ease suffering in Ukraine by providing trauma-ready ambulances for the people of Odessa and Dnipro.

Though he had originally intended to buy and refurbish a used ambulance with his own funds, folks in his Jewish community had bigger ideas. They set up a website where anyone could make contributions. And since then, hundreds of people from the Greater Lansing region, as well as overseas, have donated about \$35,000 to buy the two ambulances.

"These are not Jewish ambulances," Ody notes. "They were donated to help those of any faith or no faith at all. They are there to help our fellow human beings."

As word of his missions spread, local Rotary clubs, health systems, and business and community leaders committed to donating of thousands more in both cash and medical supplies. Accordingly, through an online auction in Italy, he recently bought a third ambulance.

Currently, Ody is planning another trip to Romania this month to prep the latest emergency vehicle for service, possibly in the heavily bombarded city of Kharkiv, Ukraine.

Deflecting any praise for his own role in these missions, Ody says, "There are many amazing people involved who I'm profoundly grateful to have met and worked with along with way. I'm just the delivery guy." We'll keep you posted on how his third trip to Romania and Ukraine works out.

## Negative COVID Test NOT Required for Air Passengers Coming into the U.S.

As of June 12, 2022, the CDC no longer requires air passengers traveling from a foreign country to the United States to show a negative COVID-19 viral test or documentation of recovery from COVID-19 before they board their flight. This is great news for Americans traveling abroad, since the requirement had forced

some to stay overseas weeks longer than they had planned. However, <u>noncitizen nonimmigrants</u> are still required to show proof of vaccination against COVID-19 before boarding a flight to the United States.



# Sample Airfares for a European Vacation

What will plane tickets cost for a two-week European vacation this summer? To get a good idea of prices, this time around we spot-checked <a href="Kayak.com">Kayak.com</a> and <a href="Kiwi.com">Kiwi.com</a>. Comparing roundtrips that leave from DTW on Saturday, July 23, and return on Sunday, Aug. 7, we found that price differences between the two may—or may not—be large. Partly, that's because Kiwi draws

some of its price data from Kayak. The upshot: It's smart to check both sites, as well as others, before booking a flight.

Factors that can also be important: Length of travel time, number of stops, plane changes, or even airport changes in Kiwi's case. In any event, we chose only return flights that arrive at DTW in time for you to catch our last run at 8:15 p.m./8:30 p.m. to Ann Arbor, Brighton, and East Lansing.

You may be able to find lower prices depending on how flexible you can be about travel dates, willingness to change planes or airports, or accept long layovers enroute to your destination. These economy roundtrip fares include taxes but not necessarily baggage or other "extras":

#### Ann Arbor Art Fair 2022.

Drawing nearly half a million attendees over three days, it's the largest juried art fair in the nation, with works by about 1,000 artists displayed (and for sale) over 30 city blocks downtown. You'll find art in virtually every medium—handcrafted ceramics, jewelry, leather and metalworks, painting, photography, sculpture, wood, and more. In addition, there will be dining and sidewalk sales, plus live music and art activities.

Now in its 62nd year, the fair is actually three

independently juried, nonprofit art fairs in one (Ann Arbor Street Art Fair, The Original; Ann Arbor Summer Art Fair; and Ann Arbor State Street Art Fair.) They all take place concurrently on Thursday, July 21, 10 a.m.– 9 p.m.; Friday, July 22, 10 a.m.– 9 p.m.; and Saturday, July 23, 10 a.m.– 8 p.m. Click here to download a map of the event. #### Michigan Challenge Balloonfest.

The 37th annual balloonfest features carnival rides, kid attractions, fireworks, and the spectacular balloon launches, fly-ins, and evening glow. This year's "Best Blues Fest in the Midwest" honors master blues guitarist John Lee Hooker, who was working as a janitor in Detroit when he released his first hit single "Boogie Chillen" in 1948.

Also performing will be "Women of the Blues" acts like Zakiya Hooker (John Lee's daughter), Ana Popovic, Bettye LaVette, Thornetta Davis, Eliza Neals, and Tosha Owens. Rounding out the lineup will be Howard

Glazer & Harmonica Shah, and Jimmy D. Scott with special guest Kern Brantley, plus with six up-and-coming musicians who will each perform a set. This day-long festival is FREE.

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

Exactly 246 years ago—on July 4, 1776—the Founding Fathers of America's original 13 colonies adopted the Declaration of Independence. Drafted by Thomas Jefferson, it condemns and proclaims freedom from the oppressive rule of Great Britain.

Including this famous passage—"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness"—it ends with fighting words: "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."

Ever since then, July 4 has been celebrated with fireworks, parades, picnics and concerts as America's Birthday!

In fact, the fighting had been ongoing for more than a year. In April 1775, local militiamen fought British soldiers in the Battles of Lexington and Concord in Massachusetts, marking the "shot heard round the world" that started the Revolutionary War. It would not end until 1783.

In 1778, France joined the war on the side of the colonists, and its assistance helped the Continental Army force the British surrender at Yorktown, Virginia in 1781. At that point, the Americans had won their freedom. Great Britain formally recognized the independence of the United States in the Treaty of Paris on Sept. 3, 1783.
