Travel Alerts

D2A2 Express Bus Expands Summer Service, Offers Cheap Rides for Commuters

The popular The D2A2 Express Bus that makes frequent daily runs between Ann Arbor's Blake Transit Center (BTC) and Detroit's Grand Circus Park will soon be adding a "midnight summer run" from Detroit to Ann Arbor. While the usual last run is at 11 p.m., starting Memorial Day weekend (Friday, Saturday and Sunday), and then every Friday and Saturday night through

Labor Day weekend, the added run will depart at 11:55 p.m. This gives visitors a bit more time to enjoy the nighttime attractions of Downtown Detroit.

And there's more good news: Folks who commute frequently between Detroit and Ann Arbor on D2A2 buses can save a lot by buying 50 one-way rides in advance with a \$100 passbook. That's just \$2 per ride for use on any D2A2 scheduled run! Details here.

Airlines to Offer Automatic Refunds for Flight Delays and Lost Bags

Starting June 25, passengers who experience airline delays or lost luggage will be able to get quicker cash refunds thanks to a new rule from the U.S. Department of Transportation. You could qualify for a refund if ...

Your domestic flight is delayed by three hours or more, or your international flight is delayed by six hours or more.

Your departure or arrival airport is different from the one specified on the itinerary you purchased.

The number of connections or plane changes is increased.

You're downgraded to a lower class of service.

You pay for a service like WiFi, seat selection, or inflight entertainment and the airline does not provide it.



The new DOT rule requires that refunds be made within seven business days for credit card payments and within 20 calendar days for other forms of payments, such as travel credits, airline miles or gift cards. Note that if you accept a credit or voucher, you'll lose the right to an automatic refund. Also, refunds must also be for the full amount of the ticket purchase price—including taxes and fees—but minus the value of any of transportation already received. See complete details here.



Safety Precautions for Traveling Abroad

If you're planning a trip to a foreign country, be sure to check the U.S. State Dept.'s <u>Travel Advisories</u>. They rate the safety risk of visiting each country by levels ranging from "1. Exercise Normal Precautions" to "4. Do Not Travel."

Currently, 19 countries are listed as Level 4. Three more—China, Mexico, as well as Israel, the West Bank and Gaza—are listed as "Other," meaning some areas within them are Level 4. For example, the State Dept. cautions travelers to avoid Mainland China due to the "arbitrary enforcement of local laws, including ... the risk of wrongful detentions."

Similarly, while Mexico is one of the most popular destinations for Americans, the State Dept. notes that "violent crime—such as homicide, kidnapping, carjacking, and robbery—is widespread and common." So, it <u>classifies</u> many areas there as Level 4.

But just knowing about potential trouble spots is not enough to keep you safe. To be better prepared, review the State Dept.'s extensive Travelers Checklist, and take action on any applicable items before going abroad.

Kensington Art Fair

The annual Memorial Day Weekend Art Fair is back from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, May 25 and 26, as well as from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday, May 27. You can join the festivities at Kensington



Metropark's Maple Beach, 4570 Huron River Pkwy., Milford. That's about a 20-minute drive east on I-96 from Michigan Flyer's location at the Brighton Meijer.

The fair features the works of more than 100 juried artists from across the country, as well as live art demonstrations, hands-on activities for kids, and a host of food trucks to satisfy hunger pangs. Admission is free for individuals but a Metroparks vehicle pass is required (\$10 daily at the toll booth, with annual pass options available).

Detroit

Michigan Central OPEN

You're invited to join in the 10-day party—beginning June 6—as the Detroit community celebrates the long-awaited renovation and reopening of the historic Michigan Central Station.

Michigan Central Station opened as a train terminal in 1914, designed by the same architects who helped to create New York City's Grand Central Station. But train travel declined over the years, and Michigan Central closed in 1988. The abandoned site eventually became downright dilapidated.

But then, led by Executive Chair Bill Ford (great-grandson of Henry Ford), the Ford Motor Co. acquired the building in 2018 and began a multimillion-dollar transformation. In two years, a former factory nearby became the home of Ford's electric vehicle and autonomous vehicle business teams. Now the area has become a 30-acre technology and cultural hub called the Michigan Central Innovation District.

From June 6-16, Michigan Central will host a public open house, offering a look inside the Station's historic ground floor with a range of exhibits, entertainment, and art. Starting May 21, you can get free tickets at MichiganCentral.com.



NOTE: <u>The D2A2 Express Bus</u> from Ann Arbor's Blake Transit Center (BTC) to Detroit's Grand Circus Park (1508 Park Ave.) can get you to within two miles of the Michigan Central celebrations.

Sample Fares for European Getaways

If you're dreaming of a European vacation this fall, now is the time to start making it a reality. The sooner you plan your adventure, the less expensive your airline tickets are apt to be. Using Skyscanner.com, we spotchecked prices for roundtrips originating at Detroit Metro Airport (DTW) on Friday, Oct. 4, and returning on Sunday, Oct. 13. Among our search criteria: Flights had to be no more than one stop or plane change in each direction, any layover between flights had to be fairly brief, and the return flight had to arrive at DTW in time

for passengers to catch our last run at 9:45 or 10 p.m. to Ann Arbor, Brighton and East Lansing.

NOTE: Lower prices than these—often by a few hundred dollars—are available for anyone who is flexible about the dates of travel, willing to change planes more than once in each direction, or doesn't mind a long layover. For example, Turkish Airlines offers many roundtrips to Europe at roughly half the cost of Delta, though the itinerary in one or both directions typically involves a layover of 12 hours or so in Istanbul. Our sample economy roundtrip fares include taxes but not necessarily baggage or other "extras."

Have a Blessed Memorial Day, and Happy Father's Day, Juneteenth & Summer!

On May 27th—Memorial Day—We Honor Those Who Gave Their Lives in Our Armed Forces Originally called Decoration Day in 1868, it began as a day of remembrance, when the graves of 620,000 people killed during the Civil War were decorated at Arlington National Cemetery. Both Confederate and Union soldiers are buried there. At the turn of the century it was renamed Memorial Day. In 1971, a federal law designated its observance on the last Monday in May, and extended the honor to all soldiers who died in



American wars. Today, the national holiday still begins at Arlington with the laying of a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the decoration of each grave with an American flag.



✓ On June 16th—the Third Sunday of the Month—We Celebrate Father's Day

In 1910, a woman named Sonora Smart Dodd—one of six children raised by a widower—staged a successful campaign to establish a Father's Day in Washington state. However, it was not until 1966 that President Lyndon Johnson signed an executive order that Father's Day be celebrated on the third Sunday in June. In 1972, President Richard Nixon issued a proclamation making it a national holiday.





✓ On June 19th–a Wednesday in 2024—We Celebrate a New Independence Day

Juneteenth—our newest national holiday—was signed into law by President Joe Biden in 2021. It establishes June 19th as a federal holiday celebrating the end of slavery in America in 1865. While President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on Jan. 1, 1863, it was not until June 19, 1865, that General Gordon Granger rode into Galveston, Texas, with his troops and freed the last of the slaves. The formal end of slavery was marked by ratification of the 13th Amendment to the Constitution on Dec. 6, 1865.

✓ On June 20—a Thursday—summer 2024 begins in the Northern Hemisphere.

Astronomically speaking, this is when the summer solstice occurs, giving the northern half of the Earth the longest day (and shortest night) of the year. In the Southern Hemisphere, it's the opposite: the June solstice marks the start of winter, when the Sun is at its lowest point in the sky.
