

Spirit Airlines Offers New Low Fares at DTW



In the <u>last edition of our E-News</u>, we reported how Spirit Airlines had emerged from bankruptcy and came zooming back into direct competition with Delta Air Lines, launching 10 new and five resuming nonstop destinations from Detroit Metro Airport. That will bring Spirit's nonstop routes from DTW to 40 by mid-June, with one more to come in October, Savannah (SAV).

Though we normally report roundtrip pricing, Michigan Flyer VP Ody Norkin—a veteran travel agent—got to wondering about Spirit's one-way airfares. Focusing on the June 10-15 period, he tapped into the Global Distribution Systems used by travel agents and found the following one-way Spirit fares, which include taxes and fees, but not baggage or other "extras."

"This enables you to fly Spirit in one direction and a different airline in the other," notes Ody. "It's a game changer in the travel industry."

Meet Your Driver, Alicia Milks

Before she even thought of changing careers, Alicia Milks remembers her aunt suggesting that she apply at Indian Trails, but she dismissed the idea. "I thought I could never drive a big bus," she recalls.

Yet, in 2022, when Alicia was looking for a job with more pay and benefits, she visited Indian Trails headquarters in Owosso. "On a whim, I walked into the garage and left my resume," she says. "When I walked out, I saw a motorcoach and thought, 'It's so huge. I can't drive that.' But two days later, I got a call inviting me to sign up for training."



Paid Training

Alicia decided to give it a try and entered our weeks-long intensive training program. "It doesn't matter if you have no experience," she notes. "You're paid while you're being trained. And the trainers emphasize that they're not going to let you out on the road without being thoroughly prepared."

Memorizing the checklist for pre-trip bus inspections—which all drivers are required to conduct before each trip—was a bit daunting for Alicia: "I thought I wouldn't be able to do it, but I did!"

And she was so excited when she passed the final written exam that she surprised herself by bursting into happy tears. Then Safety & Training Manager Becky Smith cried with her: "She told me she'd never done that before with one of her trainees." Equally pleased was her father: "He was elated for me."

At Your Service

It was also during training that Alicia first learned about Michigan Flyer, Indian Trails' airport shuttle service between East Lansing, Brighton, Ann Arbor and Detroit

Metropolitan Airport.

Like most new bus drivers, Alicia started with regular line runs and group charter trips and also served as a substitute driver for Michigan Flyer. Then several months ago, she became a regular Michigan Flyer driver.

"People so appreciate this service," she says. Alicia credits her training for the many compliments she receives from passengers about delivering a smooth ride to their destinations.

A native of the Owosso-Corunna area, Alicia appreciates the 115-year history of Indian Trails, its focus on values like customer service and passenger safety, as well as the company atmosphere: "They're good for the community and for the people who work for them. You feel supported here."

In her off hours, Alicia enjoys activities that take her outside, especially basketball, and the antics of her cat, Maui. She has only positive things to say about her new career:

Can TSA Search Your Phone at the Airport?

Well, not the Transportation Security Administration. But U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) has the right to search the phones of anyone entering the United States from a foreign country. And the legalities are, at best, unclear under the current administration in Washington, D.C.

<u>According to AFAR</u>—a prominent travel media brand—here are some precautions that American citizens and Green Card holders may want to consider to minimize the risks of delay or detention:

- Your Privacy Rights at U.S. Borders. These may be fewer than in European countries. Here, for those without immigration documentation, CBP agents can conduct searches of your electronic devices without a warrant within 100 miles of U.S. borders. According to the American Civil Liberties Union, you may also encounter Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) agents, which are part of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).
- What's Your Status? If CBP asks to search your electronic devices, your citizenship status affects what happens if you refuse to cooperate. If you're a U.S. citizen, you can't be denied entry for refusing to unlock devices, but the devices could be temporarily confiscated. Green card holders could face device confiscation and possible immigration consequences. Visa holders could be denied entry and have their visas revoked.
- **What about Legal Representation?** Only U.S. citizens have a right to legal representation at border inspections.
- **Must You Reveal Passwords?** No, not legally. But there's a possibility that refusing to unlock your device could lead to a forensic search. CBP policy states, "If the electronic device cannot be inspected because it is protected by a passcode or encryption or other security mechanism, that device may be subject to exclusion, detention, or other appropriate action or disposition."
- Extra Safeguards. Before traveling abroad, you could move electronic information off your device onto cloud storage and then retrieve it after your return. Out of an abundance of caution, you might also consider deleting texts or posts on social media that could be construed as politically divisive. Or you could leave your phone at home and purchase a prepaid phone.
- Let Someone Know You're Traveling. It's wise to share your itinerary and contact information with a trusted friend or loved one. If you're a non-citizen, also share contact information for an immigration attorney in case you're detained.

Delta Launches Seasonal DTW-Dublin Flights

Making it easier for Michiganders to explore Dublin—and other European cities as well—Delta Air Lines recently began summer nonstop service between Detroit and Dublin four days a week. The convenient schedule also makes it possible for passengers from other parts of the U.S., such as the West Coast, to connect with the Dublin flights at DTW.



Spot-checking fares on the <u>Delta website</u> for a roundtrip leaving DTW on July 9 and returning from Dublin on July 17, we found basic economy fares available for about \$1,070. The flights were nonstop in both directions.

Do Kids Need REAL ID to FLY in the U.S.?

As you may know, if you're planning to take a domestic flight in the U.S., the Dept. of Homeland Security now requires "everyone" to have a state-issued Real ID driver's license, U.S. passport or passport card, or other credentials acceptable at TSA Checkpoints. But does that apply to children 17 years old or under? No, says the TSA. However, it's wise to contact your airline in advance to find out if it has any specific ID requirements for travelers under 18.

Due to heavy road construction near the intersection of I-96 and Grand River Ave., Michigan Flyer recently moved its Brighton stop from the Meijer parking lot to the MDOT Park & Ride off Exit 53 of U.S. 23 at Whitmore Lake Rd. and 8 Mile Rd. We'll be using this temporary Park & Ride location—also known as Public Commuter Parking—to pick up and drop off passengers until further notice.

Sample Airfares for European Vacations



If you're dreaming of a European getaway this fall, now is the time to start making it a reality. The sooner you plan your adventure, the less expensive your airline tickets are apt to be. Using Skyscanner.com, we spot-checked prices for roundtrips originating at Detroit Metro Airport (DTW) on Friday, Oct. 3, and returning on Sunday, Oct. 19. Among our search criteria: Flights had to be no more than one stop or plane change in each direction, any layover between flights had to be fairly brief, and the return flight had to arrive at DTW in time for passengers to catch our last run at 9:45 or 10 p.m. to Ann Arbor, Brighton and East Lansing.

NOTE: Lower prices than these—often by a few hundred dollars—are available for anyone who's flexible about dates of travel, willing to change planes more than once in each direction or doesn't mind a long layover. Our sample economy roundtrip fares include taxes but not necessarily baggage or other "extras."

Happy Memorial Day, Father's Day, Juneteenth & Summer!



On May 26th—Memorial Day—We Honor Those Who Gave Their Lives in Our Armed Forces

Originally called Decoration Day in 1868, it began as a day of remembrance, when the graves of 620,000 people killed during the Civil War were decorated at Arlington National Cemetery. Both Confederate and Union soldiers are buried there. At the start of the 20th Century it was renamed Memorial Day. In 1971, a federal law designated its observance on the last Monday in May and extended the honor to all soldiers who died in American wars. Today, the national holiday still begins at Arlington with the laying of a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the decoration of each grave with an American flag.



On June 15th—the Third Sunday of the Month—We Celebrate Father's Day

In 1910, a woman named Sonora Smart Dodd—one of six children raised by a widower—staged a successful campaign to establish a Father's Day in Washington state. However, it was not until 1966 that President Lyndon Johnson signed an executive order that Father's Day be celebrated on the third Sunday in June. In 1972, President Richard Nixon issued a proclamation making it a national holiday.



On June 19th—a Thursday in 2025—We Celebrate Freedom Day

Juneteenth—our newest national holiday—was signed into law by President Joe Biden in 2021. It established June 19th as a federal holiday celebrating the end of slavery in America in 1865. While President Abraham Lincoln had issued the Emancipation Proclamation on Sept. 22, 1862, it was not until June 19, 1865, that General Gordon Granger rode into Galveston, Texas, with his troops and freed the last of the slaves. The formal end of slavery was marked by ratification of the 13th Amendment to the Constitution on Dec. 6, 1865.

On June 20—a Friday—Summer 2025 Begins in the Northern Hemisphere.

Astronomically speaking, this is when the summer solstice occurs, giving the northern half of the Earth the longest day (and shortest night) of the year. In the Southern Hemisphere, it's the opposite: the June solstice marks the start of winter, when the Sun is at its lowest point in the sky.
