"I live in Colorado, and the Michigan Flyer is instrumental in getting me to and from the airport, where I fly in as often as possible to visit my family. Each time the Flyer draws closer to campus, I still feel a childlike thrill as we pass the familiar buildings on Grand River, turning onto Charles Street. And there is my dad, standing in front of the Marriott, waiting for me. He's in his seventies now, retired from his longtime job at the university, and getting home to spend time with him is one of my favorite things. We spend the days talking, looking at old photos, reminiscing. The time to say goodbye always comes too soon. Recently, I stood

next to the Flyer, hugging Dad goodbye, and wiping away his tears. As we pull away from the curb, he jogs over to the corner of Albert and M.A.C. to wave and blow kisses, just as he always does. 'I love you, Dad!' I call, my own tears streaming down my face. It doesn't occur to me that he is visible to the whole bus until I hear the woman in the seat in front of me sniffling, the lady in the row behind me blowing her nose. The girl sitting next to me is wiping her eyes. A father's love is universal, and his actions struck a chord in others sitting on the bus with me. The silent solidarity of this great connection made me smile through the tears."

Thanksgiving Schedule Changes

On Thursday, Nov. 24, Michigan Flyer-AirRide will NOT operate Eastbound runs #8016, 8018, or 8020, or Westbound runs #8017, 8019, or 8021. Also, due to road closures for the annual Turkey Trot foot race, Eastbound runs #8006, 8008, and 8010 will NOT stop in Ann Arbor.

On Friday, Nov. 25, we will NOT operate Eastbound run #8002 or Westbound #8003.

Delta Lets You Check Carry-ons in the Airport Lobby

At some airports, Delta passengers now have the opportunity to voluntarily check their carry-on bags in the lobby when flights are full (instead of having to check them at the gate when there's no room in overhead bins). So, at the check-in kiosk at the airport, you may be asked if you'd like to check your carry-on early. This means you'd have less luggage to haul through the airport, as well as on and off the plane.

But before agreeing to check your carry-on, just be sure to remove anything from the bag that you might need on the plane (such as a cell phone or medication). By the way, Delta guarantees that bags checked on the domestic flights it operates will be delivered to baggage claim within 20 minutes of landing. If they're not, SkyMiles members are eligible to receive 2,500 bonus miles.



Airfares for a Holiday Getaway


How about vacationing someplace warmer than Michigan for two weeks including both Christmas and New Year's Day? To check out the possibilities with a sample trip between Friday, Dec. 23, and Saturday, Jan. 7, we used SkyScanner.com and searched for low-priced domestic roundtrips originating at Detroit Metro Airport (DTW). Turns out there are dozens of potential destinations for holiday getaways.

Our search criteria required that the flights be non-stop in both directions, and the return had to arrive at DTW

in time for you to catch Michigan Flyer's last run at 8:15 p.m./8:30 p.m. to Ann Arbor, Brighton, and East Lansing. The following economy roundtrip fares include taxes but not necessarily baggage or other "extras":

Handel's Messiah

Handel composed his oratorio Messiah during a single month in 1741, then staged its triumphant premiere at a new concert hall in Dublin. Nearly 300 years later, the ravishingly beautiful production of the Messiah by friends and colleagues in the Ann Arbor community is an annual holiday tradition. Music director Scott Hanoian conducts the UMS Choral Union and the Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra. It's at U-M Hill Auditorium, 825 N. University Ave., Ann Arbor, for two

performances: Saturday, Dec. 3, at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday, Dec. 4, at 2 p.m. <u>Tickets \$17-\$43</u>. (Note that host Doyle Armbrust of "The Society of Disobedient Listeners" will give a special pre-performance talk at 6:30 p.m. in the lower lobby of the auditorium on Saturday.)



Itzhak Perlman and Friends

Superstar violinist Itzhak Perlman is beloved by audiences around the globe for his remarkable artistry and joy in making music. Among other things, Perlman performed at the Inauguration of President Barack Obama in 2009, was awarded a Kennedy Center Honor in 2003, and played for Her Majesty The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh at a White House state dinner hosted by President George W. Bush and Mrs. Bush in 2007. For this special Ann Arbor performance, he brings together pianists Emanuel Ax and Jean-Yves Thibaudet and the Juilliard String Quartet for a mixed

chamber music program. It's at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 10, at U-M Hill Auditorium. Tickets \$28-\$181.

Fun Facts You May Not Know About Thanksgiving

The practice of giving thanks at harvest time goes back to the ancient Egyptians, Greeks, and Romans. Likewise, the indigenous peoples who occupied what is now known as North America gave thanks at harvest feasts for centuries before Europeans appeared on their shores. So, Thanksgiving has always been more than a four-day weekend in which we feast with family and friends, and then start Christmas shopping on Black Friday.

Persecuted for separating from the Church of England, a group of English people set out for America as Pilgrims. In all, 102 souls departed on the Mayflower on Sept. 6, 1620, and arrived at what is now Provincetown, Mass., on Nov. 21. They decided to settle near Plymouth Rock on Dec. 22. Fortunately, members of the Wampanoag tribe taught them to hunt, fish, and grow corn, beans, and squash, which enabled them to survive a brutal winter and successfully raise food crops. The Pilgrims and Native Americans then gave thanks together at a three-day harvest feast in autumn 1621.

On Nov. 26, 1789—in honor of the creation of the U.S. Constitution—President George Washington proclaimed Nov. 26, 1789, as a "Day of Publick Thanksgivin" in gratitude for God's grace in helping to found a new nation. The country had recently emerged from the Revolutionary War for independence from Great Britain.

For decades thereafter, Thanksgiving across the U.S. was celebrated on various dates determined by the governors of the states. Then on Nov. 26, 1863—about four months after the Union Army's victory in the Civil War's bloody Battle of Gettysburg—President Abraham Lincoln called upon Americans to "observe the last Thursday of November ... as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise."

But actually, a woman named Sarah Josepha (Buell) Hale was most responsible for establishing Thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday of November. Born on a New Hampshire farm in 1788, she was home educated by her mother and college-student brother. While women weren't allowed to be teachers at the time, she founded her own school at age 18. Then she met and married David Hale and had five children. When he died in 1822, she began writing to make ends meet. Her first book of poems included the famous nursery rhyme "Mary Had a Little Lamb."

Eventually, Hale became America's first woman magazine editor. In that position, she wrote hundreds of letters to influential people—including President Lincoln—urging that the last Thursday in November be set aside to "offer to God our tribute of joy and gratitude for the blessings of the year." Lincoln agreed.

On Nov. 26, 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed a bill into law officially creating the federal holiday of Thanksgiving.

No costumes, cards, candy, gifts, or commercialism—it's a holiday devoted just to grateful reflection on our many blessings.
