Immuno-compromised and with a host of complex medical needs, Susan needed to get to and from medical appointments at the University of Michigan health system.

A native of Queens, N.Y., Susan had moved to Michigan in 2020. Before coming here, she'd served as a substitute teacher for all grade levels at schools in the New York City area. She's a graduate of the State

University of New York at New Paltz with majors in psychology and Asian studies.

An adventurous traveler, Susan has visited numerous European and Asian countries. She also speaks Mandarin and has lived in China, teaching English to students there.

When she learned that the Flyer had resumed operations, she says, "To me, it meant the freedom to obtain the medical care that I think is best for me." She also recalls that "my first time on the Flyer was so wonderful. It made a huge impression on me. All the drivers are so attentive and caring."

Finding Freedom

"I'm a New York City native trying to navigate healthcare in Michigan. For a while [in 2020], the Flyer wasn't open/running. Suddenly, after telling everyone that 'Yes, I'd heard of it but No, it's not running,' there was a rumor that it would be opening again! This gave me hope I cannot even describe.

Until then, I could not get the care I needed at U of M. I don't drive. I am disabled, don't have a car, nor can I afford one. This was, and still is, my only means of getting the best medical care in the state. I've been profoundly impressed by the courtesy of everyone at the Flyer.

Most of my early trips were difficult because I was recovering from surgery, wearing a long leg brace. Every time I boarded, I received extra help, was met with compassion and concern, and one driver—after asking me what I'd done to be in such a position—offered me a hug! I'll never forget that.

Several times I was stressed at having to call up and move my ticket due to not being seen at the hospital on time, etc. To Rachel [in the Flyer office], it was no big deal at all. Everyone there is so kind and friendly. And it's lovely to see each driver's sense of humor come out during a trip. The entire trip from my building to the hospital is long, but it's EASY. The bus is very comfortable, and impressively clean. This service has saved my sanity!"

Nov. 12: U-M vs. Nebraska. TBA



SkyWest/Delta Restores Flights to Northern Michigan Airports

Due to public demand in affected communities, SkyWest and Delta Airlines have resumed nonstop flights between Detroit Metro Airport and Alpena, Escanaba, Iron Mountain, Pellston, and Sault Ste. Marie. Two months ago, the airlines had announced reduced flights to those towns due to a pilot shortage.

Airfares for a Thanksgiving Getaway

Every day, we help passengers connect with hundreds of nonstop flights between Detroit Metro Airport (DTW) and top domestic and international destinations. Michigan Flyer-AirRide's schedule of nine roundtrips seven days a week gives you many opportunities to take advantage of the best airfares available.

This time around, we used <u>SkyScanner.com</u> to search for the least expensive domestic economy-class fares (which include taxes but not necessarily baggage or other "extras"). Having chosen a sample trip originating

at DTW on Monday, Nov. 21, and returning on Monday, Nov. 28—and focusing only on nonstop flights—we found these and many other domestic roundtrips that depart from DTW:

A Few Fun Facts About Halloween

1. Our spooky holiday always occurs on October 31, which falls on a Monday this year. According to History.com, it began more than 2,000 years ago—before Christianity—with a festival of the Celts, who lived in what are now Ireland, the United Kingdom, and northern France. Their celebration marked the start of cold, dark winter. Believing that ghosts of the dead returned to earth at this time to make trouble and ruin crops, they tried to frighten the spirits away by donning animal heads and skins, carving ghoulish jack-o-

lanterns, and starting bonfires.

- 2. In the 700s, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as All Saints Day in hopes of replacing the pagan Celtic festival. The night before that was known as All Hallows Eve, and from this sprang the name "Halloween."
- 3. Trick-or-treating has roots in the early All Souls' Day parades of England, where poor people begged for food and families gave them "soul cakes" in return for promises to pray for bygone relatives.
- 4. In the mid-1800s, millions of immigrants poured into America, many fleeing the Irish Potato Famine. That helped to spread the celebration of Halloween nationwide, though the emphasis was on neighborhood costume parties and seasonal foods, not ghosts, goblins, and witches.
- 5. Candy corn was once called "chicken feed" because the Goelitz Confectionery Company originally sold it in boxes with a rooster on the front to appeal to rural Americans. The recipe hasn't changed much since the 1880s. And Skittles are now the top Halloween candy according to years of sales data from CandyStore.com.
- 6. Harry Houdini—the world-famous magician and illusionist—died on Halloween in 1926. A week earlier, his appendix had burst during a performance in Detroit, Mich. Although he was immediately rushed to the hospital, he succumbed to peritonitis.
