Due to popular demand—and thanks to the hard work of our parent company, Indian Trails, to recruit and train new professional drivers—we're pleased to announce that our daily schedule will grow from nine roundtrips to 12 as of Nov. 13. Specifically, we'll be adding three Eastbound runs #8000, #8004, and #8024 as shown on our upcoming new schedule, along with three Westbound runs #8001, #8005, and #8023.

The early morning Eastbound runs should go a long way toward connecting passengers with the cheapest flights out of Detroit Metro Airport (DTW), while the later



Discount Parking to be Eliminated in Ann Arbor

Michigan Flyer-AirRide passengers have long enjoyed discounted parking rates of \$2 per day for up to 14 days in the downtown parking structure at the corner of 4th Avenue and William Street. However, beginning January 8, the Ann Arbor Downtown Development Authority (DDA), which manages the structure for the city, will no

Susie describes Miles as a shy child, but larger-than-life in many ways. "He was an old soul. Very funny and wise." She adds that he loved family gatherings and holidays, basketball, the sports rivalry between Michigan State University and University of Michigan, his brothers Austin and Anthony, pizza and cheeseburgers. He also loved the trips she arranged that began with Michigan Flyer.

"Miles and Austin were 15 months apart in age and best friends," Susie says. "And since I always loved traveling as a child, I wanted to give them the experience of travel. Both boys loved the Flyer because it meant they were going to the airport." Among their favorite trips: to visit their brother Anthony in Charlotte, N.C., to Disney World, and to Los Angeles, where they got to see a Clippers game."

A single mother, Susie appreciates the cost-effectiveness of the Flyer, as well as the comfort, cleanliness, and on-time reliability of our motorcoaches.

Susie, who's retired from a position with the State of Michigan, says she was happily surprised to learn that her entry was a winner. She's still figuring out what to buy with the \$100 Amazon gift card: "I'm very economical and there's a lot to choose from." Meanwhile, she urges anyone so inclined to support Be The Match®,

A "Love Connection" is experienced with friends and family members as they drive down US-27, I-96, or US-23 and wave at the Michigan Flyer and say, "Hi, Miles!" Miles was one of my two younger sons. Usually trips to the East Lansing location meant the start of a new adventure. There were flights to Orlando, Fla., Charlotte, N.C., Atlanta, Ga., and Los Angeles, Calif., waiting at the airport after the ride on the Michigan Flyer. A ride on the Michigan Flyer meant there was freedom and safety for the family. Mom was close by but Miles and his brother, Austin, could have seats near the middle or the back by themselves. It gave them a

sense of being teenagers, but they were eight, nine, or ten. They had developed a routine for the ride, and it was economical for me, Mommy, as they were able to ride free. Sadly, the trips for Miles ended. In November 2013, Miles passed away at the age of 12, a week after being diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia (AML). A traumatic shock to family and friends, especially his travel partner and 11-year-old younger brother. As we prepared for the celebration of life, knowing that Miles loved to travel, his godfather called Michigan Flyer to get permission to add a picture of the bus in his obituary program. Permission was granted. Today, various friends and family have taken a ride on the Michigan Flyer to/from the airport. Memories of the excitement and adventure that are in store, yet to unfold. Boo at the Zoo

Little ghouls and boys can enjoy three weekends of "spooktacular" fun for the whole family including a hay bale maze, costume parade at 1:30 p.m., and candy stations (all free), plus hayrides, an inflatable zone, glow light room, cider and donuts (requiring purchase of activity tickets). Recurring weekly on Saturday and Sunday from noon to 5 p.m. until Oct. 29 at the Potter Park Zoo, 1301 S. Pennsylvania Ave., Lansing. Adult tickets \$8-\$13, children age 3-12, \$5 each, under 3 free.

NOTE: A Capital Area Transportation Authority bus can get you from East Lansing to the zoo in about 45 minutes for \$1.25. Near the corner of westbound Grand River Ave. and M.A.C. (a short walk from our location at the East Lansing Marriott), catch CATA's #1 bus to downtown Lansing. At Grand Ave., use a free transfer card to switch to the #8 bus heading south toward Holt. Get off at S. Pennsylvania Ave. and Fletcher St., then walk about 10 minutes to the zoo. See <u>CATA's Trip Planner here</u>.



Silver Bells in the City

Downtown Lansing will glow with thousands of lights for this annual celebration, which brings together some 45,000 revelers from across Michigan and beyond to kick-off the holiday season. It includes the Electric Light Parade with more than 70 floats and marching bands, the lighting of the official state Christmas tree, a Community Sing, a firefly drone light show and stunning fireworks over the Capitol dome, plus extended hours for dining and shopping in Silver Bells Village. You can even visit with Santa and Mrs. Claus and their live reindeer. It happens from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Nov. 17 in and around Washington Square downtown. This is a FREE family event open to the public. Again, CATA's #1 bus can get you there from East Lansing and back.

Kelli O'Hara in Concert

Star of stage and screen, Kelli O'Hara has established herself as one of Broadway's greatest leading ladies. Helping Students Make International Music

Earlier this week, Michigan Flyer took three motorcoaches to Detroit Metro Airport (DTW) to pick up 123 orchestra, band, and choir students who'd flown to the U.S. from Ludwigshafen, Germany. All were from Theodor-Heuss Gymnasium High School, and were traveling to Okemos, Mich., as part of a foreign exchange program that dates back 35 years.

Originally the brainchild of now-retired orchestra teacher Marilyn Kesler of Okemos High School (OHS) in collaboration with Maya Bard, her counterpart in Germany, the program has been bringing Okemos and

German students together every other year or so since the 1990s. That tradition has been carried on by newer music teachers at both schools.

Justin Valla, who's in his sixth year as the director of the OHS orchestra, applauds the exchange program: "There are so many benefits for all the students involved. The chance to make international friends of around the same age, and to learn about each other's cultures—what's different and what's similar." The costs of travel are mostly defrayed by fundraisers.



Whether the music students are performing in Michigan or Germany, the two high schools rely on local families to host them during their week-long visits, says Valla: "We encourage host families to introduce these young visitors to daily life—what they themselves like to do, where they like to go, what they like to eat. It's a chance for the students to experience a different culture."

Besides practicing each day for their closing concert, the German students also attended classes at OHS, took field trips to Uncle John's Cider Mill, Potter Park Zoo, and the Michigan State Capitol. The OHS orchestra is scheduled to travel to Germany in 2026.

Fun Facts About Halloween

- 1. Our spooky holiday always occurs on October 31, which falls on a Tuesday this year. According to History.com, it began more than 2,000 years ago before Christianity—with a festival of the Celts, who lived in what are now Ireland, the United Kingdom, and northern France. Their celebration marked the start of the cold, dark winter. Believing that ghosts of the dead returned to earth at this time to make trouble and ruin crops, they tried to frighten the spirits away by donning animal heads and skins, carving ghoulish jack-olanterns, and starting bonfires.
- 2. In the 700s, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as All Saints Day in hopes of replacing the pagan Celtic festival. The night before that was known as All Hallows Eve, and from this sprang the name "Halloween."
- 3. Trick-or-treating has roots in the early All Souls' Day parades of England, where poor people begged for food and families gave them "soul cakes" in return for promises to pray for bygone relatives.
- 4. In the mid-1800s, millions of immigrants poured into America, many fleeing the Irish Potato Famine. That helped to spread the celebration of Halloween nationwide, though the emphasis was on neighborhood costume parties and seasonal foods, not ghosts, goblins, and witches.
- 5. Harry Houdini—the world-famous magician and illusionist—died on Halloween in 1926. A week earlier, his appendix had burst during a performance in Detroit, Mich. Although he was immediately rushed to the hospital, he succumbed to peritonitis.
