

"Decades later, by chance, two of us ran across each other online. In 2018, three of us decided to meet in Las Vegas. We'd built careers in diverse fields—an auto industry engineer, a cardiologist, and a research analyst for the state legislature—and raised our children. We'd see how our Maize and Blue bonds held up. I relied on Michigan Flyer to get me to the airport from Ann Arbor. In Vegas we saw over-the-top shows, enjoyed fine dining at The Palm and Gordon Ramsay's—and White Castle, too—and experienced the cacophony of the casino floors with their sounds and neon lights making time itself hazy. When we parted, we flew back to our homes. I took my final leg on that comfortable motorcoach, slumbering from lack of sleep until safely pulling into downtown Ann Arbor.

"Three of us have returned to The Strip every year since. One friend's wife asked what it was like after all these years. He remarked it was like we'd seen each other the day before, and one had just walked into the apartment to say, 'Let's go to the video arcade.' Be Sure to Book Early for the Holidays

If you're planning a trip around Thanksgiving or Christmas, bear in mind that these are peak travel periods, with hordes of college students migrating home and back, and folks everywhere traveling to visit family and friends.

To guarantee that we have a seat for you, make your Michigan Flyer reservations without delay. Ditto for buying your airline tickets. As <u>USA Today points out</u>, America's airports saw record crowds during Thanksgiving week last year, resulting in a stressful experience for many.

It also notes that, according to NerdWallet, the least chaotic days to fly anywhere for Thanksgiving may be Saturday, Nov. 23; Monday, Nov. 25; and the holiday itself, Nov. 28. For the return flight, the least busy days should be Black Friday, Nov. 29; Tuesday, Dec. 3; and Wednesday, Dec. 4

Due in part to the 5K and 1K races of the <u>Ann Arbor Turkey Trot</u> on Thursday, Nov. 28, Michigan Flyer will be running a partial schedule at most locations (Ann Arbor, Brighton, East Lansing, and Detroit Metro Airport). Spirit Airlines to Suspend 30+ Routes



Ultra-low-cost carrier Spirit Airlines—reportedly facing tough financial straits—will <u>suspend or eliminate more than 30 routes</u> over the next few months, affecting travelers nationwide.

In fact, according to SimpleFlying.com, Spirit has already halted service between Detroit Metro Airport and Charleston International Airport in South Carolina, with no future flights planned between DTW and CHS.

USA Today Names DTW One of America's 10Best Large Airports



Meet New Safety Director Raymond Ruddy




When you board one of our motorcoaches, you can be confident that your driver is thoroughly trained in how to safely carry passengers to their destination.

That's because Raymond "Ray" Ruddy went through the same intensive, weeks-long training course required of all new drivers when he joined Indian Trails in 2018. Now, he's in charge of that course as Safety Director, after being promoted from professional driver to Operations Supervisor along the way.

The Safety Director role had previously been held by Bob Davis, who passed away in June at age 41 after a long battle with cancer. "I know I have big shoes to fill," says Ray. "It's a tough job and Bob was amazing in it. I'm going to do the very best I can. But I feel I'm up to the challenge."

Ray's Route to Indian Trails

Born in Owosso, Ray grew up in Montrose/New Lothrop, then moved to Pensacola, Fla., as a young adult and found work as a musician. He plays the piano, saxophone and drums. When he wasn't playing with bands, Ray served as a part-time music teacher and also worked for Clear Channel Radio as promotions director.



He returned to Michigan in 2015 to spend time with his aging parents and 10 siblings. It was his late sister, Colleen, who suggested he check out a driver's position at Indian Trails.

"She was right," says Ray, who now lives in Fenton, Mich. "I'm ecstatic that I took her advice. It feels like I found my home with Indian Trails. I've never held a job that I enjoyed more than this one."

The Role of Safety Director

The training program that Ray now oversees covers everything from the ins-and-outs of motorcoach maneuvering, safe driving, and navigating hazardous weather conditions, to customer service, motor carrier regulations, driver standards, and more.

"I teach new drivers that they're the captains of their ship when they're in their motorcoach," says Ray. "I impress on them, too, that Indian Trails was established more than a century ago, and it's amazing to work here, especially with the structures, rules and a great support system, developed over time. We always have the newest fleet of motorcoaches and highly trained drivers. I'm always proud to tell people where I work."

After learning how to conduct a pre-trip motorcoach safety inspection, new drivers spend time with Indian Trails' mechanics to get a deeper understanding of the items covered, as well as help them to communicate any mechanical issues they may encounter on the road.

When trainees complete the education program run by Ray, they're well-prepared for the Commercial Driver's License exam and a professional driving career that offers starting wages of \$22.28 an hour; paid time off; medical, dental, vision and life insurance; a 401(k) retirement program, and more. An Evening with Bernadette Peters



Detroit Justin Timberlake The Forget Tomorrow World Tour



Where It's Dangerous to Travel Abroad



If you're thinking about traveling to a foreign country, it's wise to first check the U.S. State Dept.'s <u>Travel Advisories</u>. They rate the safety risk of visiting each country by levels ranging from "1. Exercise Normal Precautions" to "4. Do Not Travel."

Currently, the 20 countries below are listed as Level 4. Three more—<u>China</u>, <u>Mexico</u>, as well as <u>Israel</u>, <u>the West Bank and Gaza</u>—are listed as "Other," meaning some areas within them are Level 3 "Reconsider Travel," or Level 4.

For example, travelers are cautioned to avoid Mainland China due to the "arbitrary enforcement of local laws, including ... the risk of wrongful detentions." Similarly, while Mexico is a popular destination for Americans, the State Dept. notes that "violent crime—such as homicide, kidnapping, carjacking, and robbery—is widespread and common" in many areas.

Beyond learning about potential trouble spots, it's wise to join the State Dept.'s <u>Smart Traveler Enrollment Program</u>. STEP participants get real-time updates about health, weather, safety, and security in the country where they're traveling. Moreover, this helps the embassy or consulate to contact you if there's an emergency like a natural disaster, civil unrest, or a family emergency.

Where's Your Bus? Find Out with Our Real-Time Tracker

If a Hurricane or Global Tech Outage Disrupted Your Flight, Ask for a Refund



Last July, the cybersecurity firm
CrowdStrike—which provides software to
thousands of companies worldwide—
applied a faulty update to computers
running Microsoft Windows. That instantly
caused a historic global disruption that
knocked airlines, hospitals, businesses,
governments, and countless other
organizations offline. Thousands of flights
were delayed or cancelled in the U.S. and
around the world.

Then came Hurricane Helene in late September, followed by Hurricane Milton this month, both causing flight disruptions for thousands of travelers.

If your flight was affected by such an event, or any other—and if your airline has not yet refunded the cost of your ticket—then you should request it ASAP. Under a <u>rule implemented by the U.S. Department of Transportation</u>, you qualify for a refund if (among other things) your domestic flight was delayed by three hours or more, or your international flight was delayed by six hours or more. That's true even if the ticket was sold as non-refundable. Depending on the airline, you might also be entitled to reimbursement for expenses such as meals and lodging. <u>See the DOT's "dashboard"</u> for info on what each airline will cover in the event of a delay or cancellation.

The DOT rule requires that refunds be made within seven business days for credit card payments and within 20 calendar days for other forms of payments, such as travel credits, airline miles or gift cards. Note that if you accept a credit or voucher, you'll lose the right to an automatic refund. Also, refunds must also be for the full amount of the

ticket purchase price—including taxes and fees—but minus the value of any transportation already received. <u>See complete details here</u>.

Fun Facts About Halloween



- Our spooky holiday always occurs on October 31, which is a Thursday this year.
 According to <u>History.com</u>, it began more than 2,000 years ago—before
 Christianity—with a festival of the Celts, who lived in what are now Ireland, the
 United Kingdom, and northern France. Their celebration marked the start of the
 cold, dark winter. Believing that ghosts of the dead returned to earth at this time
 to make trouble and ruin crops, they tried to frighten the spirits away by
 donning animal heads and skins, carving ghoulish jack-o-lanterns, and starting
 bonfires.
- In the 700s, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as All Saints Day in hopes of replacing the pagan Celtic festival. The night before was known as All Hallows Eve, and from this sprang the name "Halloween."
- Trick-or-treating has roots in the early All Souls' Day parades of England, when poor people begged for food and families gave them "soul cakes" in return for promises to pray for bygone relatives.
- In the mid-1800s, millions of immigrants poured into America, many fleeing the Irish Potato Famine. That helped to spread the celebration of Halloween nationwide, though the emphasis was on neighborhood costume parties and seasonal foods, not ghosts, goblins, and witches.
